Course Outline

- Civic rights, duties and obligations
- Patriotism, loyalty and development of a sense of nationalism
- The roles of organizations such as Boys' scout, Boys' Brigade, Girls Guide, Red Cross, Amnesty International, War Against Indiscipline, War Against Indiscipline and Corruption, Operation Sweep, etc.

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ASE 152 – Socio-Economic Environments in Nigeria {3 Units}

Man's economic activities. The structure, activities and functions of socio-economic systems. A hierarchy of basic human needs and wants, in relations to survival. Conflict between needs and wants and man's ability to make viable economic choices. Division of labour in the socio-economic systems. Productive resources: human {workers, managers, know-how} capital {tools, machines, factories} nature {soil, water, climate, minerals, forests}. Economic activities performed by government and firms. Resources-utilization, conservation and problem.

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ASE 153 – The School and Society in Nigeria {3 Units}

This course discusses the socialization functions of school. Topics include the functions of school, the hidden curriculum, the norms taught in school, cultural pluralism, the social structure of the classroom, and school discipline. Political economy of education, i.e a study of the relationship among education, economics and politics in Nigeria.

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ASE 154 – The Family in Traditional and Contemporary Societies {3 Units}

Comparative cross-cultural studies of family structure: types of families, their similarities and peculiarities in different ethnic groups in Nigeria. Evaluation of the family system and factors {economic, technological and education} affecting the traditional family structure. The ‘modern’ family. The family in national developments.

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ASE 156 – The People and Culture of Nigeria {3 Units}

Definition of culture, man as the focus of Social Studies. Socialization agencies and institutions such as marriage, religion and health, legal and civic obligations. Rights and responsibilities. Major differences and similarities in the cultures of the people in Nigeria are highlighted.

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ASE 158 – Pre-Colonial Political Systems in Africa {3 Units}

Analysis of pre-colonial political structures with the attendant checks and balances among the Yoruba, Edo, Igbo, Hausa/Fulani and Kanuri people. Examples are also drawn from other West African, North African, East and Central African as well as South African countries.

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ASE 251- Problems of Social Interactions in Nigeria {3 Units}

The history, sources, factors and aims of social interactions in Nigeria in pre-colonial and modern times. Political systems and cultural institutions in pre-colonial Nigeria.

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ASE 204 –Supervision in Education {2 Units}

Definition and scope of supervision. The good and bad supervisor, Teaching practice and its involvement. Current programmes of Teaching Practice in Nigeria schools, colleges and universities.

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ASE 104 – Schooling and Poverty in Nigeria {2 Units}

Differences between urban and rural setting. Effects of setting on School establishment and location. Equality, education and opportunity, equalization of opportunity, culture of poverty. Social class and school achievement. Culture, family and school success: issues and problems.

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ASE 254 – Collective Behaviour in Social Groups {3 Units}

Definitions, principles and theories of collective behaviour. Social stratification and associated behaviour of competing social groups. Characteristics of collective behaviour - their processes and consequences. Riots, mobs, thuggery and crowd as types of excitatory and spontaneous collectives, historical analysis of the socio-political roots and implications of collective behaviour. Social order, causes of social disorder. The judiciary and its functions.

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ASE 255 – Nigerian Government and Politics up to 1966 {3 Units}

Analysis of politics, power and government. Forms of government. The Indirect Rule, The Constitutions made by Clifford, Richard, McPherson, Littleton, and their characteristics. Growth and Development of Political Parties in Nigeria. Nationalist activities. The Independence and Republican Constitutions. Reasons that led to military intervention.

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ASE 256 : Socio-Economic Structure and Activities in Nigeria {3 Units}

The structure of Nigeria's socio-economic system and the problems and goals of the society. The organizational structure of labour markets. The types and sources of employment. The Nigeria Labour Congress {NLC}: History, organization, functions and its socio-economic significance.

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ASE 258 – Culture and Social Stability (3 Units)

The concepts of culture and identity; common heritages and national symbols, cross cultural influences, social change, alienation and social stability.

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ASE 351 – Finance and Financial Institutions in Nigeria {3 Units}

Money-historical development, types, characteristics and functions in developing societies. Money and capital markets. Development structure, organization and functions of banks. Development, commercial, merchant, people, community and mortgage banks and institutions. The Central Bank of Nigeria. Insurance companies and the Stock Exchange. Fiscal Policy and Public Finance. Taxation and Revenue Allocation in Nigeria.

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ASE 352 – Bureaucracy and the Problems of Public Utilities {3 Units}

A consideration of the history, emergence and functions of bureaucracy in public institutions. An analysis of the structure, organization and performance of important public institutions and utilities e.g Educational Institutions, Customs, PHCN, NIPOST, Civil Service, NITEL, Privatization and Commercialization of Public Institutions.

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ASE 353 – Community Organization and Development {3 Units}

A survey of the basic concept of community organization as it affects the individual and his environment. Attention is given to the social roles of institutions such as the family, school volunteer and government agencies, peer groups etc. and the linkages among these institutions and groups.

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ASE 354 – Leadership, Followership and Nationalism in Nigeria {3 Units}

Politics and Political institutions. The indigenous political organization. The growth and development of political parties in Nigeria. Goals and strategies of nationalists in Pre-independence Nigeria. Politics and crisis in nation building in Nigeria – 1960 up to date. Patriotism – it's relationship with National Development; Patriotism, Social Problems and Issues, Common heritage and national symbols.

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ASE 355 – Environment, Education and Development {3 Units}

An analysis of the nature, value and distribution of events in the atmospheric, hydrospheric and lithospheric environments. The philosophy, history and objectives of Environmental Education, Ecology, ecosystems and man – a consideration of the activities of humans and their effects on the environment. Man as agent of environmental deterioration – The nature, causes and types of pollution and society. The Federal Environmental Protection Agency {FEPA}: Its origin and functions. The evolution of other environmental agencies. Roles of government, individuals and education in promoting sustainable environment. Effects of environment on education and development.

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ASE 356 – The Structure and Methods of Social Studies in the Secondary School

Curriculum {3 units}

The nature and objectives of Social Studies in the Secondary School Curriculum. Concepts, principles, theories and generalizations in Social Studies. Recent innovations and reforms in Social Studies education.

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ASE 302 Educational Management {2 Units}

Differences between management and administration. Management vitality. Instructional staff management. Functions and problems of Education management bodies e.g The Ministries of Education, NERDC, WAEC, J.C.C., N.T.I., Board of Governors. Communication as a tool in management. Student affairs office and its roles. Management by Objectives {MBO}, Scientific Management, Management Constraint.

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ASE 403 – Creativity in Education {2 Units}

The different approaches to problem solving and current issues in creativity are aspects of this course. The practical approach to solving creativity problems are exposed to students that take this

course. Convergent and Divergent thinking and tests of creativity, Research, personality and inkblot test, etc. are interesting aspects of this course.

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ASE 404 – Classroom Management and Techniques { 2 Units}

The course examiners: the need for classroom management; the distinction between classroom management and school administration, academic management of students – admission, registration, etc. classification, class welfare service of students, classroom records and purposes of keeping them; management principles that are useful in solving classroom management problems. Social science movement approaches and the humanitarian concept.
